SYDNEY

Australia's most populous and famous city is strategically situated along the world's largest and deepest natural harbour. It is Australia's gateway. A relatively new city by world standards, it juxtaposes both modernity and traditional civilizations, and an international aire while also being emblematic of all things "Australian." The Opera House--the icon that represents Sydney to the world--took 16 years to build and is a must visit on any first timer's itinerary. The adjacent Harbour Bridge is one of the longest steel arches in the world & dominates the skyline. Sydney is dynamically multi-cultural, with 1/3 of population born overseas. Arabic, Mandarin, and Cantonese are the dominant lingo of some neighborhoods, making some decentralized neighborhoods ripe for exploration given the variety of cuisines and experiences they offer. There are more Thai restaurants in the city than any other place in the world outside of Thailand, and nearly 22% of Sydneysiders identify as LGBTQ.

Park Hyatt Sydney

650usd / night, 156 rooms

The most luxurious property in Sydney, and a gem in the Hyatt portfolio. Rooms look directly at the Opera House (unless there's a cruise ship parked beside the hotel). 24-hour butler service. Day spa, rooftop pool, and sun deck. The hotel spa is a great way to relax with the steam, sauna, or a treatment. Rave reviewers call it "perfect" and "extraordinary."

Capella Sydney ★

368us/night, 192 rooms

Well-located in the CBD, one block from Circular Quay. Housed in a historical brick building, with a focus on Aboriginal art. Spa, indoor pool and gym. Just opened 5 months ago, there maybe a few kinks to work out as with any hotel opening, but reviewers don't note many issues so far. "Flawless" "old fashioned hospitality."

Ovolo Wooloomoolo

260usd/night, 100 rooms

Ultra-hip and cutting edge Australian brand with rave reviews. Waterfront. Vegetarian food & beverage.

The Fullerton


280usd/night, 416 rooms

Housed in the stately Old Post Office, this Singapore brand offers contemporary interiors with a taupe palette. Heritage rooms have high ceilings and tall windows in the old building, while modern rooms are in a separate tower.


W Sydney ★

190usd/night, 588 rooms


Opened in late 2023, W Hotels ended its hiatus on the Australian market with this iconic, curve-shaped anchor by Australian architect Hassell at the terminus of Darling Harbor. The Michelin Guide calls it "only marginally less recognizable than Sydney's opera house." Part of a pearl of waterfront dining, urban strolling, and nightlife, this contemporary hotel celebrates Sydney's free spirited and daring personality. Billed as an urban retreat, sleek metallics contrast supple and bold velvetine furnishings in the Living Room lounge, a popular meeting point for cocktails. The 30 meter lap pool overlooks the harbor on the 29th floor, complimenting a second, indoor, pool with a similar view below, amounting to - perhaps - the best swimming in town. There's a full service spa and gym, plus BTWN restaurant. Like any W Hotel, a romantic spin on nightlife is core experience, so expect buzzing beats throughout the day and night. And true to the brand, guests are polarized in their reviews: many praise the design and energy, while others expecting more formal (not average) service relative to the price tag recommend other options.

Sydney Opera House ♦

One of the world's most iconic buildings designed by Danish architect Jørn Utzon, completed in 1973. It took 16 years to build and was more than 10x overbudget. Tours offered daily, including an architecture tour. See the nightly graphic shows projected on the side of the 'sails,' or catch a performance inside the concert hall.

Sydney Tower Eye

One of the tallest observation decks in the Southern Hemisphere, in the CBD with incredible views.

Royal Botanic Garden ♦

Australia's oldest botanical garden, and the grandest green space in Sydney. Free admission.

Sydney Fish Market

The largest market of its kind in the Southern Hemisphere and the world's 3rd largest fish market.

Art Gallery of NSW

Classical, indigenous, and modern art collections. A current "clay" room exhibition allows you to sculpt and leave a ball of clay as part of the installation experience. A new, multi-level glass pavilion is by SANAA architects, and is adjacent to a landscape by architect Kathryn Gustafson.

Museum of Contemporary Art ♦

In the Rocks, a very modern art collection.

The University of Sydney

Traditional neo-gothic campus good for strolling.

Darling Harbour ♦

Home to the W Sydney and a new metro hub, visitors must not miss Barangaroo Reserve landscape and King Street Wharf's new waterfront development including posh restaurants and condo complexes.

Taronga Zoo

From the Aboriginal word "beautiful view," Australia's largest zoo collection offers exceptional views of the Harbour while boasting Australia's most famous stars: its wildlife.

Harbour Bridge

Nearly 100 years old and nicknamed "the coat hanger," this bridge is one of Australia's most renowned landmarks - not just for its visual impact on the city, but also because many daring travellers now embark on the 1300-step, 3+ hour climbs led by expert guides.

Potts Point

Cafes by day, bars and night life by evening. Excellent Saturday Farmer's Market.

Newtown

24-7 bohemian neighborhood with international cuisine, bookshops, thrift shops.





Vegetarian dining in the uber-hip Ovolo hotel.

The Butler

Ibero-American in a plant-filled room.

Tetsuya's

One of the finest restaurants in Sydney.

Saint Peter

Trendy and small culinary gem in the Paddington neighborhood just outside the CBD.

Vogue Café

Chic waterfront bistro co-branded with the namesake fashion magazine.

Midden

The new alfresco restaurant adjacent to the Opera House by Mark Olive, one of Australia's most celebrated aboriginal chefs, offers a menu that showcases native ingredients. Note reservations are hard to come by.

Clam Bar

Mid Century, slightly retro cafe serving oysters and caviar in the CBD.

Le Foote

A new brasserie on George Street that feels a century old, with wood-fired dishes.

Jimmy's Falafel

Uber casual CBD diner with a cool 70s casbah feel, live DJ, and Middle Eastern plates.

a'Mare

Al fresco spot on the Barangaroo waterfront with trendy seafood, but be warned for spotty service.



Japanese style cheesecake eatery.


